

PREFACE

Gujarat University is the oldest and largest university of the state. It underwent the accreditation process by NAAC in 2006-07. The quality of education provided by this university was duly recognized by NAAC as the university was given B++ grade (83.1%). Since than the university has been strongly striving for further quality enhancement in order to achieve its vision of 'Being a centre of excellence, providing value based quality education efficiently with financial sustainability leading to socio-economic welfare of the society through enrichment of human capital'. The highlights of these efforts are given below:

- 1. Several new programmes were introduced during the year, which include one at P.G. level, three at P.G. Diploma level and one at Certificate level. Most of these were innovative and multidisciplinary programmes such as courses related to Human Genetics, Bio-Diversity Management, Plant Tissue Culture and Port Management.
- 2. In order to become a truly global university a very unique the **STUDY ABROAD PROGRAMME** was introduced. This specially catered to fulfill the demand for courses totally embedded in the Indian ethos for foreign students. These students could select several short term courses out of a wide range of subjects related to India spanning business, culture, history, arts, music, film, and

dance to Indian cuisine. The backbone was formed by a compulsory course on Gandhian Philosophy. The courses were so designed that the students could avail of matching credits in their home universities. Collaboration was established with EDUCATION COUNCIL OF INDIA LIMITED, New Delhi through which many foreign students from developing countries like Nepal, Bhutan and Afghanistan were provided opportunity to undergo graduation in the affiliated colleges of this university. Three students from USA have already completed a full semester under this programme in India.

- 3. The introduction of new courses was not restricted to the university departments only but the affiliated colleges were also encouraged to introduce new courses especially under the CAREER ORIENTED PROGRAMMES of UGC. During the year thirty five different courses were introduced under career oriented programmes in ten colleges.
- 4. Amongst the younger faculty members four faculty members participated in **Orientation courses** conducted by academic staff colleges of UGC and five faculty members underwent **refresher courses** in their respective subjects.
- 5. During the year the university departments organized **nine** seminars, one conference and one workshop, for which funding

- was provided by organizations like University Grants

 Commission, Forward Markets Commission, Ahmedabad

 Commodity Exchange etc.
- 6. Thirteen guest lectures were delivered by eminent scholars in Economics, Political science, Education and Gujarati department.
- 7. Research publications have been strong points of the university faculty. A total of **179 Research papers** were published in International/National/State level Journals.
- 8. The university journal **Vidya** and the newsletter **Vidyavrutt** were published regularly. A total of **25** research articles were published in vidya during the year. Vidyavrutt covered news from university, its school and departments and affiliated colleges. Important news items related to UGC, the state government and other institutions of higher education were also published in Vidyavruttt.
- 9. The university entered into two MoUs with the organizations like

 British Petroleum and Wroclaw University, Poland.
- 10. Beginning with the Vice-Chancellor many awards were conferred on the faculty members of the university. Notable amongst them were **Shiksha Rattan Puraskar** for outstanding and remarkable performance in the area of education by India International Friendship Society, New Delhi and **Gujarat Shresth** award for the

valued contribution in education area by **Padma Gandhi Foundation.** Conferred on the Vice-Chancellor. Apart from these **nine other faculty members received various awards** for their research work.

- 11. A total of 134 students appeared in various public exams like IAS, NET/GSLET etc.
- 12. A total of **21 scholars** from various schools and departments of the university were awarded **Ph.D. Degree** during the year.
- 13. During the year **four faculty members** visited **USA**, **Poland**, **Singapore and China** to present papers and participate in international conferences/seminars and thirty one faculty members visited twenty five different institutions in many cities to participate and present papers in various seminars and conferences. This report has been prepared as per the NAAC guidelines. The Statistical Abstract Table below provides a comprehensive statistical progress profile of the university after the submission of SSR.

Each and every stake holder of the university beginning with the teachers, the administrative staff, officers, students, members of various bodies of the university have contributed fully towards quality enhancement process. Here I would like to put my

appreciation of their contribution and support in putting this university on a firm footing in the global arena.






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
GRAPH – II PROGRESS OF STUDENTS ENROLLEMENT





NEW BOOKS PURCHASED





PUBLICATIONS BY FACULTY MEMBERS






AWARDS RECEIVED BY FACULTY MEMBERS





SPECIAL NOTE ON THE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PEER TEAM

The NAAC Peer Team visited the campus in March 2007 and gave several suggestions in their report. In this special note point wise details regarding the actions taken on the suggestions of the Peer Team are given.

1.Building linkages with colleges

The University undertook a special drive to enable the colleges to undergo accreditation. Further approval has been granted for Career Oriented Programs to be implemented by the colleges. Further details are given in point No. 41 of the report.

2. College Development Council

This has already been established and Dr. Y. T. Jasrai, Head Botany Department has been given the charge.

3. Encouragement for R&D Activities, interdisciplinary courses and international linkages

A lot of encouragement was given to all the departments to enhance research activities and to develop linkages at international level. Details are given in point No.s13, 11,4 & 2 (interdisciplinary programs), and 40

4. New Programs to be introduced

In view of the strengths of the University, the needs of the society and recent developments the world over, many new programs were introduced. Details are given in point No. 2

5. Remedial courses and bridge courses

Work on introducing such courses is going on. More information is provided under point no.2

6. Changes in syllabi

An action plan to implement the semester system is being chalked out.

Changes and additions in the existing syllabi are given in detail in point

No. 3

7. Computerization

Details of work done in this area are given in point No.s 25,26,27 & 28.

8. Grievance Redressal Cell and Placement Cell

A new state of art Students Information will be set up in the coming year and the Grievance Redressal Cell and the Placement Cell would operate out of it.

9. Academic And administrative audit

The modalities for establishing these systems are being worked out.

10. Filling vacant faculty and other positions

Work is going on for filling all vacancies at the earliest.

11. Students' Feedback and Self Appraisal

A system has been worked out and will be implemented from the coming year.

The self appraisal for faculty will be introduced soon while that for the administrative staff is under development.

12. Alumni Associations

It has not been possible to form an alumni association at university level.

Most of the departments have either formed these associations or are in
the process of forming them. Furthern details are given in point No. 30

13. Industry Interaction Cell and IPR cell

The linkages established with industry are given in point No. 40. The university plans to introduce courses in IPR through which the IPR cell will be established.

14. Establishment of Board of Studies

The board of studies will be reconstituted in the coming year after the term of the current ones expire, as per the university provisions.

15.Linkage with INFLIBNET

The University has a V-sat link though which all the facilities of INFLIBNET are availed of.

16. Financial planning

As per the recommendations of the Peer Team, the academic calendar is following diligently. Every department and self-financed course formulates its own budget.

17. Functional autonomy to teaching departments

All the departments have full autonomy with regard to self-financed courses. However, some schedules are provided by the University for regular courses in view of management requirements and coordination.

18. Mentoring system

In view of the continuing shortage of staff mentoring system is not introduced as yet but it will be introduced once there is a full complement of staff.

19. Resource mobilization

The University has been leasing its extensive properties to garner additional resources. Considerable funds are generated through self financed programs. Further details are given in point No. 12.

20. Innovative approaches

Details about these are given in point No. 3

21. Modern equipments

Details about these are given in point No. point No. 26.

22. Research guides, flexible mechanism for research projects and choice based credit system

The University is slowly working towards these as the current system will take time to change.

23. Facilities for physically challenged

The University is planning to install more facilties for them.

24. University Science and Instrumentation Center

Efforts are on to put this back on a fully working level.

SECTION - III ACTIVITIES DURING THE YEAR.

In this part the major activities relating to quality maintenance and quality enhancement are described.

As stated above, there was very little time available for the performance of the IQAC in this academic year. Nevertheless, under the able supervision of the Vice-Chancellor, a lot of activity took place on and off the campus. Besides, there were some very remarkable events which were not initially planned. Therefore, in this section all the major activities which occurred during the year are briefly described as per the IQAC format. 1. ACTIVITIES REFLECTING THE GOALS AND OBJECTIVES OF THE INSTITUTIONS.

The main goals of the University are:

- a) Empowering Students through modern syllabi
- b) Innovation in Teaching
- c) Promotion of Research, Consultancy & Extension for the benefits of the society
- d) Quality Improvement to enhance Global Competitiveness

In order to fulfill these, the activities on which special focus was given were:

- i) Introduction of new innovative courses with high potential for employment
- ii) Technology up gradation
- iii) Developing international linkages
- iv) Increasing focus on student centric activities
- v) Encouraging research
- vi) Skill development of non-teaching staff.

2. NEW COURSES ADDED DURING THE YEAR

The University intends to increase the capabilities of its students so that they can stand global competition. In order to fulfill this goal, the University has been planning and introducing many new courses in its campus. It has also encouraged the affiliated colleges to introduce new courses and especially those which are very career-oriented. Since the list of such career oriented programmes is very large, information only about the courses introduced in the University teaching departments is given. The details of the new courses are given in Table - I below.

4. INTER-DISCIPLINARY PROGRAMMES STARTED

The University introduced five new courses during the year. Out of these two were of inter-disciplinary nature. The details of these programmes are given in Table-1, serial no four and five.

5. EXAMINATION REFORMS IMPLEMENTED:

The University has more than 3,50,000 students covering nine different faculties in 380 colleges spread over an area of more than 1000 Sq.Kms. Examinations are therefore a mammoth task. Examinations go on throughout the year and require complex planning. During the last few years the University has perfected the examination system through computerization to such an extent that even for the largest number of students appearing in an examination (for example First Year B.A. or B.Com.), the results are declared within three months. In the current year some more reforms were

implemented with the twin objectives of increasing the efficiency of the system and providing better facilities to the students. The major activities undertaken during the year with regard to the examination reforms are given below.

a. CHANGES IN EXAMINATION FORMS

ICR based form were introduced in the Final Year of B.A., B.Com., B.Sc., B.B.A. and B.C.A. and Master Degree Exams.

b. CHANGES IN ALLOCATION OF CENTERS

For the first time PG exam centers for M.A. and M.Com. were allotted in 6 different centers outside Ahmedabad. The students therefore had to travel a shorter distance for writing the exams.

c. CHANGES IN DISTRIBUTION OF HALL TICKETS

Computerized Hall ticket was also given in M.A. Examination and Bar Code System was also introduced in M.A. Examination

d. CHANGES IN PREPARATION AND PUBLICATION OF RESULT

This time instead of total marks the entire mark sheet was uploaded on the internet.

6. DETAILS OF STUDENTS CLEARING PUBLIC EXAM

It is quite difficult to obtain the exact number of students who appear and clear the various public examinations. This is due to the fact that the students often sit for these exams after they clear the university examination and many of them do not keep in touch with the University in spite of persistent efforts by the faculty and alumni associations. As per the information available, the details of the students who appeared for the public exams are given in Table – III below:

A. Department of Microbiology - Dr. S. R. Dave

Research Project: Microbial leaching of base metals

MAJOR OBJECTIVE OF THE RESEARCH PROJECTS ARE:

- ➤ Screening of iron and sulphur oxidizing bacterial cultures from our laboratory for indirect process as well as isolation of new organism from selective mines.
- > Development of biofilm process.
- ➤ Optimization of metal extraction by biologically produced ferrous at second stage.
- Regeneration of ferric from leachate under prevailing adverse conditions by developing desired inocula.
- > Scale-up.
- Project was started with appointment of two research fellows. And
 as per the objective mine water samples from Amba Multi metal
 mine were analysed for their physio chemical parameters and it
 was found that acidic mine drainage was generated due to activity
 of iron and sulphur oxidizers. Mine drainage water.
- Showed pH as low as below 3.0 and presence of copper and zinc. Iron and sulphur oxidizing bacteria were isolated from the mine water. Iron, sulphur and thiosulphate oxidizing study is under progress for the isolates.
- Bioleaching amenability study of low-grade polymetallic ore as well as waste products generated after the generation of metal extraction process.
- Cultures are developed for higher iron oxidation rate in the presence of increasing concentration of ferrous and other toxic metals in the system. Organisms were selected looking to their IOR and metal resistance ability. Iron oxidation studies are under progress.

In direct metal extraction from poly metallic concentration was

investigated and their optimization studies are under progress.

16. INTERNAL RESOURCES GENERATED

The University has been able to generate a total of Rs.2,44,94,840. This excludes the fee collection from the students. These have been raised from activities such as transfer of fees from self-financed courses, rent of premises to various organizations, donations, affiliation fee from colleges etc.

17. DETAILS OF DEPARTMENTS GETTING SAP/DST.FIST ETC.

Departments of Botany, Chemistry, Physics, Microbiology and Zoology were getting support under programmes such as SAP/DST FIST etc. The details are given in Table Nos. IV, V and VI above.

18. COMMUNITY SERVICES

The Jan Shikshan Sansthan based in the University conducts many short term programs which are available for person s who dropped out of the formal education system at an early stage and now are seeking skill development and skill up gradation for increasing employability and earning capacity.

19. TEACHERS AND OFFICERS NEWLY RECRUITED

The vacant posts were identified and the process of recruitment on these posts is under process.

20. TEACHING-NON TEACHING STAFF RATIO

There are 131 Teaching staff and the strength of the non-teaching staff is 484. Therefore the ratio of the teaching staff to non-teaching staff works out to be 0.31:1.

21. IMPROVEMENT IN THE LIBRARY SERVICES

The work of the automation of the library is going on and is expected to be completed in another year. The V Sat connection has been established in the library premises so that e resources can be utilized in the library premises. Further work is going on for the purchase of more e resources.

23. ASSESSMENT OF TEACHERS BY STUDENTS

24. UNIT COST OF EDUCATION

The unit cost of education is Rs 44051.57 including the salary component and Rs 26,952.37 excluding it.

25. COMPUTERIZATION OF ADMINISTRATION AND THE PROCESS OF ADMISSIONS AND EXAMINATION RESULTS, ISSUE OF CERTIFICATES.

The computerization of examination, results and certificates was done years ago. However, several measures have been taken to improve the system further. These have been described in detail in point 5 above.

27. TECHNOLOGY UPGRADATION

The University has been paying special attention to the up gradation of technology. In this connection the following activities took place:

- i) Automation of Library
- ii) Work started to acquire e-resources
- iii) Planning started to implement Wi-Fi network in the campus
- iv) Plan started to set up Students Information center where all the information required by the various types of students will be provided online, on telephones and personally.
- v) Purchase of several modern equipments especially in the School of Science
- vi) Computerization of administrative departments.

28. COMPUTER AND INTERNET ACCESS AND TRAINING TO TEACHERS AND STUDENTS.

All the teaching and non-teaching departments have already been provided with computers and internet connections. A special internet access center has been set up for the students where the students just have to pay Rs.15/- to obtain a token for accessing internet. All the teachers are computer literate and therefore no new programs were run to provide computer and internet training to them. 60% of the administrative staff of clerical cadre and above is computer literate. Care is taken to ensure that all new recruitments are computer literate. The Rollwala Computer center provides training in all types of hardware including SPSS to the staff on request.

29. FINANCIAL AID TO STUDENTS

The students are provided scholarships as per the government provisions. They are provided hostels (boarding and lodging) at highly subsidized rates. A new hostel block in the ladies hostel has been built up. Hostel accommodation is provided to outstation external students on a token fee of Rs.5/- per day. The University play grounds are freely available to the students for sports. The university canteen provided food to the students at very nominal rats.

30. ACTIVITIES AND SUPPORT FROM ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

The University has 36 teaching departments imparting courses in very diverse fields. As such it was not easy to establish an alumni association at the University level. Further many departments already had formed alumni associations long back. Under the circumstances, alumni associations have been formed in the departments where they did not exist. The existing alumni association is being revived to ensure at least one meet every year.

The main purpose of such meetings is to get a feedback from the alumni for changing syllabi and teaching methods, include activities which will increase the employability of the students, seek help of the alumni in placement, raising funds, etc.

31. ACTIVITES AND SUPPORT FROM PARENT-TEACHER ASSOCIATION

Many departments tried to organize a Parent-Teacher meet to start an association. There was very poor response to this attempt due to many reasons. First of all the University has only post-graduate and research students. They are normally quite mature so there are very few problems for which the attention of the parents needs to be drawn. Secondly, many students come from other towns and their parents find it difficult to travel all the way to Ahmedabad just for a meeting. The parents are not aware of the utility of their participation in the teaching process and convincing them of this fact would take some time. Lastly the time logistics of such meetings are very awkward so that no convenient time for all the parties concerned could be generally fixed.

Under the circumstances, the departments are planning to communicate with the parents through letters and emails and hopefully an on-line platform would be developed for this purpose.

32. HEALTH SEVICES

The University has a well equipped health center. Health services begin the day a student or employee joins the University. The first step is to do a complete health check up and start the medical record for everybody. Then

medical services including those of specialists are provided free of cost to the employees and with a nominal fee of fifty paise to the students. This scheme covers the families of the staff also.

33. PERFPORMANCE IN SPORTS ACTIVITIES

The University has a Central Gymkhana under which sports activities are organized. All affiliate colleges and university departments take part in the sports activities which cover field and track events to popular sports like Kabaddi, Cricket, Carom, Chess, Badminton, Table Tennis, etc. The University level winners who went on to participate at the inter-university level were provided with blazers. No events could find a winner from the University at the inter-university level.

Plans are being made to improve both the sporting facilities and coaching facilities in the XIth plan.

34. INCENTIVES TO OUTSTANDING SPORTS PERSONS

The participants at inter-university levels were given cash prizes and blazers as incentives.

35. STUDENTS ACHIEVEMNTS AND AWARDS

A total of 236 medals were awarded to students appearing in various examinations.

36. ACTIVITIES OF THE GUIDANCE AND COUNSELING UNIT

37. PLACEMENT SERVICES PROVIDED TO THE STUDENTS.

Some of the departments providing professional courses such as Master of Labour Welfare, Master of Business Administration, Master of Computer Applications & Information Technology and Master of Computer Applications have been providing regular placement services to the students. Plans are being made to set up a centralized placement office in the University itself.

The University has already provided space for the Government's Employment Bureau to set up its office in the premises years ago. This office provides all needed information to the students and registers them for employment also.

38. DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM FOR NON-TEACHING STAFF

In the previous years several programs for computer literacy were run for the non-teaching staff. This has resulted in a computer literacy rate of

around 80% amongst the clerical staff. Plans are being made to provide skill upgradation training to the staff in various fields.

39. HEALTHY PRACTICES OF THE INSTITUTION

In the large University setup examination is the most difficult task. One or the other examinations have to be conducted throughout the year. The main focus of the University has been to modify and computerize the examination system to the utmost extent on priority basis. The work done in this area is given in point No. 5 above. 40. LINKAGES DEVELOPED WITH NATIONAL/ INTERNATIONAL ACADEMIC/RESEARCH BODIES

I. STUDY ABROAD PROGRAM

Gujarat University has a lot to offer at international level. Further, the increasing globalization of education implies that we must reach out to the world. In this connection this University made very special efforts due to

which the Ministry of Human Resource Development granted permission to only this University to conduct courses for foreign students. Thus was born 'KADAMB' – the center which runs the STUDY ABROAD PROGRAM OF THE UNIVESITY. Since it started working in June 2007, 38 foreign students have studied in various colleges of the University and five students have completed full semesters during one year. All these students have done the compulsory course on Gandhian Philosophy. Many more students are expected to come next year.

The Study Abroad Program offers 12 special courses for foreign students, 13 courses for NRIs and 13 other international courses.

II. RESEARCH SPONSORSHIP AGREEMENT BETWEEN GUJARAT UNIVERSITY AND BRITISH PETROLEUM INTERNATIONAL LIMITED.

British Petroleum has sponsored a research program with a funding of GBP 50,000/- for development of Jatropha – a plant which is used for manufacture of biofuel. A special laboratory has been set up in the department of Microbiology for this purpose and Prof. Meenu Saraf is its coordinator.

41. NAAC RELATED ACTIVITIES

The University has a very large number of affiliated colleges. Some of these colleges are well aware of the importance of quality enhancement and have undergone the accreditation process. But there are many colleges which needed to develop awareness about quality enhancement and also needed help for undergoing the accreditation process. Thus the University tried to improve the quality of its own service delivery on one hand and tried to help out the affiliated colleges to undergo the accreditation process. The steps taken to help out the affiliated colleges with their accreditation process are outlined below.

- II. Development of structural program for preparation of LOI, IEQA and SSR by Dr.H.C.Sardar and Dr.Neerja Arun
- III. One day orientation program for Principals of affiliated colleges of Gujarat University where the Commissioner, Higher Education, Mrs.Jayanti Ravi was the chief Guest. Enumeration of progress of accreditation work of colleges.
- IV. A special drive was undertaken by the members of the IQAC to help the affiliated colleges to submit IEQA, solve the problems related to rejection of IEQA, enable better contact with NAAC and help in preparation of SSR. In this connection special focus has been given to colleges in the rural areas.
